SERMON NOTES Sunday 11 February sunnyside**church**

Bible passages: Mark 9.2-9; 2 Corinthians 4.3-6

Introduction

- Transfiguration metamorphosis Jesus changed from within to glorious radiance which he had before the incarnation and will have when he comes again
- Gives disciples fresh insight into who Jesus is
- Moses (freedom from slavery) and Elijah (faithfulness to God): lots of parallels with Jesus but point to freedom from sin he brings us and call to follow him

Transfiguration as an encouragement to us:

1. Reminder of who Jesus is

- Jesus is God's beloved Son
- We can be God's beloved sons and daughters because of what Jesus did for us

2. Reminder of our calling

- Listen to him!
- We are called to be faithful to Jesus in the mundane and glorious moments of life

3. Reminder of the importance of time apart with God

- Jesus and others in the Bible take time aside to spend with God (often on mountains)
- Need space for encounter but then need to live in the valley of everyday life

Conclusion

We have the light of Christ in our hearts 'treasure in jars of clay' (2 Corinthians 4.7)

Some questions for discussion

- 1. What words would you use to describe Jesus Christ?
- 2. Read Mark 9.2-9. What do you notice?
- 3. Why do you think that this story happens at this point in the Gospel of Mark?
- 4. In what ways do you remind yourself of who Jesus is?
- 5. 'Listen to me!' How might listening to Jesus help us to be faithful in the mundane as well as the glorious?
- 6. What might it look like for you to take time to be alone with God?
- 7. Read 2 Corinthians 4.3-6. In light of the story of the Transfiguration, what might it mean for us to have treasure in jars of clay?
- 8. What is God asking you to do as a result of what he has said to you through these passages? It might be something to pray about, something to think more about, something he wants you to talk to someone about or something he wants you to do. Make a note of it so you don't forget!
